Amy Tan: San Jose State




The author of the mega-selling *The Joy Luck Club* — which became a cultural sensation immediately upon publication in 1989 — as well as several other bestselling volumes, Tan got her bachelor's and master's degree from San Jose State, where she studied English and linguistics.

Oprah: Tennessee State University



The one-named star of a one-woman empire, Oprah — North America's only African-American billionaire — earned her bachelor's degree at Tennessee State University. She also held down a radio job while matriculating — the first in a series of broadcast media jobs that would eventually lead her to be nicknamed "the Queen of All Media."

Steven Spielberg



Reportedly rejected by both the [University of Southern California](#) and [UCLA](#), at least once each, for his less than stellar grades, film director Steven Spielberg enrolled instead at [Cal State Long Beach](#).

Spielberg dropped out just short of graduation, when offered a movie deal, [but returned in 2001](#) to finish his one remaining science course. He graduated in 2002 with a BA.

Tom Hanks




In [a 2015 New York Times essay](#) in praise of community college, actor Tom Hanks wrote that he applied to three places: [M.I.T.](#), [Villanova](#), and [Chabot College](#), the two-year school in Hayward, Calif., that he eventually attended. He held out little hope for the first two—"knowing such fine schools would never accept a student like me but hoping they'd toss some car stickers my way for taking a shot."

After two years at Chabot, Hanks transferred to Sacramento State. In his *Times* essay, Hanks recalled that he "drove past the [Chabot] campus a few years ago with one of my kids and summed up my two years there this way: 'That place made me what I am today.'"

A note about selection by major..




- Students with *firm career goal* (specialized areas)- look for a course of study that matches your needs
- Most students *change their majors at least 2 to 3 times before graduation* and once in the working world
- Some end up in jobs bearing no relation to their academic specialty..

The self assessment process: Who are you?

- 1) **Interests** - Consider these questions when self-assessing your interests:
 - What do you like to do in your spare time?
 - What activities make you lose track of time?
 - What are the most interesting jobs you can think of?
 - What is your favorite subjects in school?
 - What kinds of things would you do if money were no object?
- 2) **Values** - Values are, simply put, what is important to you. They (should) determine your priorities. Think about these things:
 - Where do you want to live and work?
 - What kind of job appeals to you?
 - What kind of working conditions will be rewarding to you?
 - What level of responsibility can you handle?
 - What salary level is important for you to attain?
- 3) **Skills** - Skills are simply the things you learn that enable you to perform certain tasks well. Think about these things:
 - What skills and activities come naturally to you?
 - What skills do you enjoy using?
 - What skills would you like to develop?
 - What skills do employers desire?




16 Personalities


Online assessment tool used to help you **identify your personality preferences**, including how you focus your attention and energy, acquire or gather information, make decisions, arrive at conclusions, or make judgments, and how you relate to the outer world.



Measures your level of interest in occupational areas, activities, subjects of study and work environments, and then compares your interests with working professionals in a wide variety of occupations.





College Applications Timeline




College Application Timeline by Grade Level



Trifecta of compiling a “Balanced” College List

- **Fit** = What the students want
- **Match** = How likely will the student be admitted
- **Cost** = How much will the parents *able* to pay



Factors used to determine your selections:

- ★ Your Weighted GPA
- ★ Location/Setting/Size
- ★ *Financial Fit*
- ★ Academic Majors/Programs
- ★ Student Ratio
- ★ Student life on campus (Sports, Clubs, etc)



Examples of Safety Colleges:

- CSU East Bay (82%)
- UC Merced (93.3%)
- Out-of-state colleges (Eg: UNR, WSU, ASU)
- Community Colleges (Eg: DVC or LMC)

Fit - What the students wants

- 1) Locations**
(States/Distance from home)
- 2) Majors**
(undeclared?)
- 3) Campus services**
(Disability services)
- 4) Test scores?**
- 5) Sports/Band/Cheers?**
- 6) Types**
(4 years vs 2 years vs Private vs Public vs Technical)
- 7) Campus Life/Class size and Settings**
(Student populations/Urban vs Rural vs “near the beach”)



Cost - How much will the parents *able* to pay

How to determine your financial fit?

- Students need to be “cost-conscious” as you consider your college options - A more expensive college, or even one that is more selective, is not necessarily the ***best fit***.
- Make sure you compare schools based on the net price by using the colleges’ [**Net Price Calculator**](#). **Net Price** is the amount that a student pays to attend an institution in a single academic year AFTER subtracting scholarships and grants the student receives.

Net Price/Cost = Total Cost of Attendance - Gift Aid (Grant + Scholarships)



College List (Apply List)

- We encourage all students to apply to **6 - 10** Colleges and Universities.
- When creating a **“BALANCED”** college list, we encourage you to include colleges that fall into these three categories: **Dream/Reach, Target and Safety.**

Dream Schools

A dream school is a college where ***your academic credentials fall in the lower end, or below, the school's average range*** for the cohort of students accepted the previous year.

Dream schools might be long shots, but they are still possible.

Financial needs, academic strength and a college's desire to have you on campus can all influence your financial aid award and make cost of attendance manageable. **(1-2)**

Target Schools

A target school is one where your academic credentials (***grades, test scores and class rank***) fall within the school's ***average*** range for the most recently accepted class.

There is ***no guarantees***, but it's reasonable to expect to be accepted to several of your target schools. **(3-4)**

Safety Schools

A safety school is one where your academic credentials ***exceed*** the school's range for the average freshman.

You should be reasonably certain that you will be admitted to your safety schools.


Like your dream and target schools, these should also be colleges you'd be ***happy to attend.*** **(2-4)**

BEFORE YOU GO

- Find out which college will be at the fair and write down the ones you want to learn about
- Make a list of questions to ask
- Bring list of questions, pen and a bag to hold college brochures
- Get ready to introduce yourself with a professional email ready to be given out to colleges
- Be sure that you arrive with an open mind; some of the less selective schools could end up as interesting safety options for you.

WHILE YOU'RE THERE & AFTERWARDS

- Plan your route to find the colleges you want to meet
- Visit their booths and ask prepared questions
- Take a minute to jot down important information to review afterwards
- Check out colleges not on your list if you have time
- Attend information sessions if offered
- Explore interesting colleges' websites to narrow your college list

- What admissions readers look for when reading applications?
- Early Decision/Early Action over Regular Decision?
- Best ways to engage admission office as a prospective student?

Campus Visit Checklist

When you visit a campus, it is important that you ask the right types of questions:

Look at Equipment and School Facilities

- Are the facilities and equipment up-to-date and operating?
- Is the equipment similar to what you will be using on the job?
- Is the library good for studying and research?
- How large are the dorm rooms? What type of furniture are provided/allowed?
- Are the dorm rooms quiet enough for studying?
- What is the cafeteria like?
- Are there plenty of computer labs?
- Do students get free e-mail and Internet access?

Sit in on a Class or Two

- Do the instructors seem knowledgeable?
- Are the students participating in classroom activities?
- What kinds of work are the students doing?
- How large/small are the classes?

Talk with Current Students in the Program

- How long have they been in school?
- Are they learning what they need to know to get a job?
- What is their opinion of the instructors? Are instructors available outside of class?
- Do the instructors spend time with them to be sure they understand the material?
- How much time is needed for studying and other work outside class?
- Have they had any problems with the school, the instructors or the classes?
- What do they like most/least about the school/program?
- How do they spend their free time?
- What are the other students like?

Talk with Instructors in the Program

- What are the academic requirements in the program?
- What kinds of courses are offered? How often are they offered?
- How many students are in the program? How many are accepted into the program each year?
- How long does it take most students to complete the program?
- How long have they taught at the school? Do they teach full time or part time?
- What background do they have in the field? How does it relate to the courses they teach?
- What types of activities are they involved in that relate to the field of study?

Talk with an Admissions Counselor

- Has the institution and its programs been accredited by a recognized accrediting association?
- What are the admissions requirements for the college or for a specific program?
- How do you apply and which forms do you fill out?
- When are the important deadlines for admissions?
- Will your family's ability to pay for college be a factor in the admissions process?
- What are the housing requirements and parking rules?
- What types of extracurricular activities are available?
- Can credits be earned online or transferred from other colleges?
- What percentage of first-year students return the following year?
- What percentage of graduates are employed within one year?

Talk with a Financial Aid Counselor

- How much does it cost to attend the college (including tuition, room and board, fees, etc.)?
- What financial aid options are available?
- Does the school participate in federal and state aid programs? (Not all schools are eligible.)
- What percentage of undergraduates receive aid? How much do they receive on average?
- Which financial aid forms do you need to fill out and what are the deadlines?
- Does the college offer scholarships? Who is most likely to receive them? How do you apply?
- Will private/non-government scholarships reduce the amount of need-based aid you receive?
- How is financial aid paid out? When will you receive it?
